THE 1981 U.N. DECLARATION ON THE ELIMINATION OF ALL FORMS OF INTOLERANCE AND OF DISCRIMINATION BASED ON RELIGION OR BELIEF

Adopted by the General Assembly of the United Nations 25 November, 1981 (Resolution: 36/55)

ARTICLE 4

All States shall take effective measures to prevent and eliminate discrimination on grounds of religion or belief in the recognition, exercise and enjoyment of human rights and fundamental freedoms in all fields of civil, economic, political, social and cultural life.

PARAGRAPH 4.1.2: Are there effective measures to prevent and eliminate discrimination on grounds of religion or belief in the field of economic life?

PARAGRAPH 4.1.5: Are there effective measures to prevent and eliminate discrimination on grounds of religion or belief in the field of cultural life?

"It's too early yet to predict a timetable or what will happen," says Lee Roper-Batker, president and CEO of the Women's Foundation of Minnesota. 'Women have to have big audacious goals. That is the way change happens."

The Women's Foundation of Minnesota was founded in 1983. It is the oldest and second largest statewide women's foundation in the nation, and remains the only grant-making organization in Minnesota dedicated exclusively to growing equality for women and girls, according to their website http://www.wfmn.org. The foundation has a program to "create economic justice for women" and a human rights program vision statement that reads; "We look forward to a day when women's human rights and dignity are unquestioned, when women are free from discrimination and able to act upon their dreams."

In assisting financing for "Somali Women Make Minneapolis Their Business" they are uniquely positioned in Minnesota to participate in a local education and dialogue program to discuss how to incorporate the values of the United Nations Convention on the Elimination of all Forms of Discrimination Against Women (CEDAW) and Article 18 - Everyone has a right to freedom of religion or belief - of the International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights (ICCPR).

CONCLUSIONS

The Tandem Project proposes all Inter-faith dialogue groups consider human rights education on the value of International Standards on Freedom of Religion or Belief, as a way to promote respect for the dignity and equal rights of all persons, religious and non-religious.

The 1948 Universal Declaration of Human Rights First Preamble affirms: "Whereas recognition of the inherent dignity and of the equal and inalienable rights of all members of the human family is the foundation of freedom, justice and peace in the world. This principle suggests all States recalling their history, culture and constitution, provide equal protection by law for theistic, non-theistic and atheistic beliefs, as well as the right not to profess any religion or belief. This is international law under the United Nations Covenant on Civil and Political Rights. International Human Rights Standards on Freedom of Religion or Belief may be essential for long term solutions to conflicts based on religion or belief.

The Tandem Project: a non-profit, non-governmental organization established in 1986 to build understanding and respect for diversity of religion or belief, and prevent discrimination in matters relating to freedom of religion or belief. The Tandem Project has sponsored multiple conferences, curricula, reference materials and programs on Article 18 of the International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights – Everyone shall have the right to freedom of thought, conscience and religion - and the 1981 United Nations Declaration on the Elimination of All Forms of Intolerance and Discrimination Based on Religion or Belief.

The Tandem Project initiative was launched in 1986 as the result of a co-founder representing the World Federation of United Nations Associations (WFUNA) at a 1984 United Nations Geneva Seminar, Encouragement of Understanding, Tolerance and Respect in Matters Relating to Freedom of Religion or Belief, called by the UN Secretariat on ways to implement the 1981 UN Declaration.
